The Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize, 2020

Eligibility and entry guidelines

The Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize is an annual award which allows an emerging Caribbean writer living and working in the Anglophone Caribbean to devote time to advancing or finishing a literary work, with support from an established writer as mentor. The Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize is sponsored by philanthropist Dr. Kongshiek Achong Low and administered by The Bocas Lit Fest and the literary charitable trust, Arvon.

In its second year, 2020, The Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize will be awarded for a literary non-fiction work in progress.

See Appendix 1 for a definition of literary non-fiction for the purposes of the Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize.

The Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize consists of:

- 1. A cash award of \$20,000TT (or the equivalent in US dollars);
- 2. A year's mentoring by an established writer;
- 3. Travel to the United Kingdom to attend a one-week intensive Arvon creative writing course at one of Arvon's internationally renowned writing houses;
- 4. A three-day stay in London during which Arvon, in association with the Free Word Centre, will host an event that features the winner of the Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize;
- 5. Rogers, Coleridge & White, the London literary agency, has the option to agent the winning writer if they choose to do so. The writer is free to pursue other agents if RCW does not exercise the option.

The winner of the 2020 Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize will be announced during the 2020 NGC Bocas Lit Fest.

To be eligible for entry, a writer must:

- 1. Be of Caribbean birth or citizenship, living and working in the Anglophone Caribbean and writing in English;
- 2. Be over the age of 18 by 30 September, 2019
- 3. Not have previously published a book-length work in the genre in which they are making a submission (non-fiction). For the purposes of this prize, self-published books do not count as 'previously published', and authors who have self-published in the non-fiction genre may still submit work-in-progress to the prize.

See Appendix 2 for a list of eligible territories for the purposes of the Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize.

Each entrant may make only one submission for the 2020 Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize. Each submission must include:

- 1. A maximum of 3,000 words from a work in progress which the Prize will allow the writer to advance or complete;
- 2. An outline of the entire work in progress and how the writer plans to develop it
- 3. A statement of no more than 500 words about why your work should be supported by this Prize;
- 4. A copy of two pieces of previously published creative writing in any genre (not exceeding 2,000 words each). One extract from a longer work is acceptable. State the date and place of publication and the name of the publisher of each piece. Note: extracts from personal blogs or self-published work will not be accepted as samples of previously published writing. Transcripts of publicly performed writing (e.g. work read at a curated festival or public show) will be accepted. In the case of performance work, state the date and name of the event/ place of reading;
- 5. A completed entry form.

Note: All submissions should be typed in a basic font, 12 point, black, with double spacing. Submissions must be submitted as .doc or .pdf files. Please ensure that submissions are carefully proofread and formatting is complete.

Submissions must be made electronically. Please send all submission materials attached in separate documents in a single email addressed to awards@bocaslitfest.com. The email subject line should read "Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize".

- The 2020 Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize opens for entries on 15 July 2019. The closing date is 30 September 2019, at 6:00 pm TT time. No late entries will be accepted.
- The Johnson and Amoy Achong Prize will be judged by a panel comprising representatives of the Achong family and Arvon, an agent from the Rogers, Coleridge & White literary agency, and up to two representatives of the Bocas Lit Fest.

Appendix 1

Definition of literary non-fiction

Literary non-fiction refers to works of creative prose based on fact. It is a broad genre including (but not limited to) biography and memoir, travel writing, history and current affairs, and essays on diverse topics.

For the purposes of the 2020 Johnson and Amoy Achong Caribbean Writers Prize, the following types of writing are NOT eligible: school texts, reference works (such as dictionaries or encyclopedias), how-to books, primarily pictorial texts, and technical or specialist texts not intended for a general audience.

- George Price: A Life Revealed, by Godfrey P. Smith (past winner of the OCM Bocas Prize for Non-Fiction)
- The Sky's Wild Noise: Selected Essays, by Rupert Roopnaraine (past winner of the OCM Bocas Prize for Non-Fiction)
- Writing Down the Vision: Essays and Prophecies, by Kei Miller (past winner of the OCM Bocas Prize for Non-Fiction)
- High Mas: Carnival and the Poetics of Caribbean Culture, by Kevin Adonis Browne (past winner of the OCM Bocas Prize for Non-Fiction)
